### "Tutoring Diverse Student Populations" Dr. Kimberly Rodriguez

Dr. Kimberly M. Rodriguez (Pronouns: she, her, hers) is a Staff Psychologist and the Cultural Diversity Liaison at TWU Counseling and Psychological Services. Dr. Rodriguez received her M.S. in Educational Psychology and Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from Texas A&M University. She completed her pre-doctoral internship training at Texas Woman's University's CAPS and completed her post-doctoral fellowship at the University of New Hampshire Counseling Center. Dr. Rodriguez's professional interests include the academic persistence and resiliency of First Generation College Students (FGCS), diversity/multiculturalism issues, interpersonal dynamics, self-compassion, training and supervision, and outreach. Dr. Rodriguez values being part of the facilitation of outreach programs such as Diversity Institute, ALLY training, and Cultural Café that seek to increase multicultural awareness, to discuss a broad variety of diversity related variables, and to explore the intersectionality within cultural identities.

#### **Texas Woman's University**

Since the Write Site's move to its new space last September, we have been working to further collaborate with other departments now that we are in a more visible location in order to carry out TWU's tradition of community and to find the best ways of serving our students. Shortly after our move, we worked with the research librarians to implement an embedded librarian into the Write Site schedule in order to assist students who were specifically seeking help in the research stage of their writing. We've seen a lot of appreciation from students who have been able to use the embedded librarian!

We also collaborated with Career Connections to host the first Workplace Written Communication Skills workshop on April 6. The daylong workshop focused on resumes, cover letters, and interpersonal communication within the workplace. Students arrived eager to improve the drafts they brought in for review. The Write Site is looking forward to hosting similar events and to continue to expand our resources to all TWU students!
